Department of Communication and Media

Preparing for the Major

The Department of Communication and Media has four primary majors: Communication (with specialties in organizational, public, and interpersonal/intercultural communication), Radio/Television Production or Management, Journalism, and Public Relations. For each area there is a MAJOR PLAN listing the courses and number of credits you need for that major. Although major requirements are listed in the college catalog, you should check with the Communication and Media Department for the most current guidelines.

On the major plans, you will notice that there are required core or lower division courses that you may take before you can declare a major (you must have 30 credits and a 2.0 or higher GPA to declare any major in Communication and Media). Some of our courses “double count”; that is, they can count toward the major as well as a specific general education requirement. Some general education courses may not count toward your major but offer you complementary skills and knowledge.

The following are Communication and Media courses recommended for students considering one of our majors. Courses that “double count” have the GEIII category with which they overlap listed in bold.

Communication

In understanding human communication, courses in psychology, sociology and anthropology may be particularly useful as general electives, such as 80272 General Psychology, 87100 Introduction to Sociology, and 07214 Cultural Anthropology. These examples count as **SSCI** in the GE III program. 77227 Introduction to International Politics is another good elective in this area and it, too, is a **SSCI**.

If you are interested in political communication, you may wish to take 77216, American Government and Politics, to meet the **USST** requirement.

Radio/Television Production

Courses in psychology, sociology, anthropology, political science, English, theatre, music and art also make particularly good electives, whether they count as GE or “free” electives. Advice for the other areas also applies to you.

Journalism

It is always a good idea for journalists (and all citizens) to understand the political system, so 77216 American Government and Politics would be a good course to fulfill the **USST** requirement.

Any course that heightens appreciation for the written word is recommended. For example, consider 41210 Great Books: Western, for the (**WEST**) requirement, and 41211 Great Books: Asian Classics, for the (**WRLD**).

As a journalist, you may eventually specialize in covering science, art or politics, so you should choose GE courses accordingly. Examples include 10200 Art Criticism (**ART**) and 17200 Introduction to Africa (**WRLD**). In choosing a language to fulfill the language requirement (**FLNG**), consider where you might be working.

Public Relations

Courses in psychology and sociology can be very useful as general electives. 77216 American Government and Politics is a good option for fulfilling the **USST** requirement.

Communication Disorders

This information is provided to assist in the advising of students considering the Communication Disorders major.

Students may register for Deaf Culture and Heritage (88202), which counts for **DIVR** and Sign Language I (88260), which does not currently, but may be approved this year as **FLNG**. Both courses may also be used as electives within the major. Students who have taken ASL in high school may be able to place into Sign 2.

88312 (Intro to Comm. Disorders) and 88306 (Language Development in Children) are both required of majors, but are open to non-majors and may be taken during the sophomore year. The remaining courses in the department are restricted to declared majors. Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.8 to declare the major and should do so in the spring of the sophomore year at the latest as the major sequence begins in the fall of the junior year.

The department provides pre-major advising and encourages interested students to contact the department office, Humanities Building 14a, 257-3620, early in their college career to learn more about the major and the fields of speech-language pathology and audiology.

48273, **Physical Geography**, can be taken during the first year. It is required for certification **and** satisfies one science component (**NSCI**) of the General Education III requirements. It is a good idea to have an MPL of at least 3 when taking this course. 64240, **Math for Elementary School Teachers II**, satisfies the GEIII (**MATH**) requirement and is required for certification. The prerequisite is 64140, **Math for Elementary School Teachers I**, which requires an MPL of 3. Students who will be pursuing a teaching major in Math or Science can take these courses early in their undergraduate careers. Students in other teaching majors, however, are advised to take these courses closer to their professional semesters.

- ◆ The program is designed to begin in the second semester of the sophomore year. Applications should be made, therefore, by the fall semester of the sophomore year.
