Capstone Pre-requisite Course (CPC) and the Capstone Seminar (ASN 400)

The Asian Studies Capstone experience is a two-part process. First, to demonstrate their mastery of the subject, graduating major students write a research paper in an Asian Studies "Capstone-Pre-requisite Course" (CPC). Second, the paper is revised and transformed into an oral presentation in the capstone seminar (ASN 400). **Students must finish both the CPC and the seminar for graduation**.

NOTE:

- Students must carefully plan when to take the CPC and the seminar. The seminar will only be offered once a year in the spring semester. The CPC must be taken before the seminar, either in the fall immediately preceding the seminar, or in the spring of the prior academic year. Exceptions may be made to accommodate study abroad; consult your advisor.
- Students need advance approval from the Program Director in order to designate a course as their CPC. The Program Director will announce which CPC courses will be available in the next semester. If students intend to take a CPC course, they should contact the Director prior to registration to get approval for their selection.
