

Guide for Undergraduate Communication Disorders Majors

This guide is designed to introduce students to the Communication Disorders department and the undergraduate major. All undergraduate majors take fundamental courses in both speech-language pathology and audiology. This is a liberal arts major that prepares students for careers and graduate programs in speech-language pathology, audiology, deaf education, special education, and related fields.

A master's degree and certification by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) are required to work as a Speech-Language Pathologist (SLP). State licensure is also required to work as an SLP in a school setting. A doctoral degree in audiology is required to practice as an Audiologist.

Equity and Inclusion in the Communication Disorders Department

We, the faculty and staff of the Communication Disorders department, support and stand by the Black Lives Matter movement. Our students who are Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) are an integral part of our program. We acknowledge our students' experiences of racism and bias and their frustration with persistent, institutionalized inequality. - Revise existing programs to ensure inclusivity for the benefit of our students, clients, and families.

Getting Started

Students who are considering a major in Communication Disorders may consider the following actions:

Investigate careers in speech-language pathology, audiology, and related fields.
 Resources are available in the <u>Career Resource Center</u>, located in the Humanities
 Building, Room 105.

- 2. Consider taking CMD200-Survey of Communication Disorders. This course provides a good introduction to professional fields associated with the major.
- 3. Request an advisor in the Communication Disorders Department early in your academic career in your freshman or sophomore year. This is done by declaring a pre-major in Communication Disorders. Technically there is no pre-major program in Communication Disorders; declaring the pre-major allows students to be assigned an advisor in the Communication Disorders Department prior to declaring the major.
- 4. Become familiar with the wealth of information on the <u>ASHA website</u>. ASHA is the organization that certifies SLPs nationwide, and they oversee the accreditation of graduate programs offered by schools in the U.S.
- 5. Consider clerical work in the Communication Disorders Department office and the Speech-Language and Hearing Center (SLHC). Work-study positions may be available for those who qualify, and there may be temporary service positions, which are open to all students.

Senior students who are majoring in something other than Communication Disorders but are interested in pursuing a master's degree in Communication Disorders are encouraged to meet with the Communication Disorders Department Chair. They may be eligible to enroll in the Post-Baccalaureate Program in Communication Disorders upon graduation.

Next Steps

Declare the Major

To declare the major, students must have completed at least 30 college credits – see "Recommended Courses" below. Students must also have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0. This GPA must include all college-level coursework completed to date, at New Paltz or elsewhere.

To declare, contact the Communication Disorders Department and request a meeting with the Department Chair.

Join a Club

There are two student-lead clubs, the National Student Speech-Language and Hearing Association (NSSHLA) and the American Sign Language Club. These clubs may not be active every semester, and new clubs may be established. Clubs provide opportunities for faculty mentorship and involvement in professional activities, academics, leadership, volunteerism and fundraising. Members may also provide tours at the open house for prospective students, and help with department events. NSSHLA typically hosts fall and spring banquets each year.

Many students take minors along with the Communication Disorders major. Suggested minors include:

When considering a minor, students are encouraged to discuss these and other options with the academic major advisor and an advisor in the minor department.

Recommended Courses

General Education (GE) requirements should be fulfilled in the first two years of college if possible. Students can select GE courses that also satisfy ASHA certification requirements.

Glossary of Useful Terms

Audiologist – a specialist in hearing science and the assessment and remediation of hearing loss. These professionals measure hearing ability and identify, evaluate, manage, and work to prevent and treat disorders of hearing and balance.

ASHA or the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association – the national professional association for speech-language pathology and audiology.

Certificate of Clinical Competence (CCC) – This certificate is awarded by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) upon completion of a master's degree in communication disorders, a year of paid experience known as the Clinical Fellowship Year (CFY) or (CF), passing the national examination in the field, and completion of the certificate application. Separate certificates are awarded in speech-language pathology and audiology.

Clinical Fellowship Year (CFY) or (CF) – A minimum of nine months of full-time professional employment or comparable part-time employment that is supervised by an ASHA-certified professional. The CFY is obtained following the master's degree.

Clinical Clock Hours – Time spent observing assessment and/or remediation of a speech, language, or hearing disorder. These hours must be documented and include the 25 hours of supervised observations which are obtained in CMD401-Observations & Clinical Methods.

Code of Ethics – Refers to the principles and requirements described by ASHA for the ethical conduct of professional speech-language pathologists and audiologists.

Graduate Record Examination (GRE) – This is a general, lengthy examination required by many graduate schools as a requirement for admission. It is required for admission to SUNY New Paltz graduate school. It may be taken during the senior year of undergraduate study.
