








Introducing Presenter, Lewis Brownstein



Lewis Brownstein is Professor Emeritus of International Relations at the State University of New York at New Paltz. He joined the faculty in 1968 after completing his doctorate at the School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University. His doctoral research was conducted in Kenya where he lived for a year. In 1974-75 he taught as a Visiting Professor of International Relations at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He has returned numerous times to the area on research trips and study missions including one on terrorism in Israel

in 2005 and one to Oman in 2012. He has taught courses on terrorism, defense issues, the international relations of the Middle East, American foreign policy, political theory, revolution and counterrevolution and related topics. He served for twelve years as chair of his department and gives numerous lectures on his areas of expertise in the Mid-Hudson region.

I'm trying to think back...I think it was in September of 2014 when I first became acquainted with the LLI. Dr. Shala Mills, Liaison

SUNY New Paltz announced the appointment of Dr. Shala Mills as the College's new assistant vice presi-



dent for graduate and extended learning after a competitive national search. She assumed her new role on August 28. Mills previously served as director of liberal education and chair and professor of political science, at Fort Hays State University in Kansas.

As the assistant vice president for graduate and extended learning at SUNY New Paltz, Mills provides leadership to our programs in graduate and extended learning, including summer session, winter session, online and hybrid courses, and extension programs, including Lifetime Learning. She works closely with academic departments across the College, as well as with the Center for International Programs, to support the College's goals of providing high-quality educational opportunities to a wide range of students throughout the region and beyond.

"Dr. Mills was eager to work with the campus community in continuing its excellent graduate programming and further developing online and hybrid programs for students at both the undergraduate and graduate level," said Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Lorin Basden Arnold. "Her enthusiasm and experience in leading initiatives that

capitalize on multiple teaching modalities will serve us well as we work to provide an excellent education to students, in the region and beyond."

Mills has provided leadership to a variety of curricular initiatives while at Fort Hays University (FHSU). She helped guide the process of revising the University's Liberal and General Education Program, led the Department of Political Science as it expanded its undergraduate program into the online environment, and shepherded growth in several primarily online interdisciplinary Masters of Liberal Studies and Masters of Professional Studies programs. She also created the Political Science Department's dual degree program with Shenyang Normal University in China.

Mills has taught courses in the areas of law and the courts, current political issues, sustainability, food and politics, and global challenges. She has served as one of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities' Global Engagement Scholars, as the National Coordinator for the AASCU Global Challenges Project, and spent her 2015-16 sabbatical serving as the National Manager for AASCU's Blended Course Consortium. Her most recent publications and presentations have covered global challenges, academic assessment and leadership, and new models for educating students.

At FHSU she has been engaged in a wide range of service activities including leading FHSU's Food and Hunger Initiatives and managing FHSU's two-year Healthy Living Grant with the Kansas Health Foundation. Civic engagement is one of her core values, permeating her teaching, scholarship and service, and leading her to involvement in the AASCU American Democracy Project where she serves on the National Steering Committee. In 2017, Mills was the recipient of the AASCU American Democracy Project Barbara Burch Award for Faculty Leadership in Civic Engagement.

Mills is excited to have joined SUNY New Paltz in the role of assistant vice president for graduate and extended learning. Commenting on her appointment, she said, "It is clear that SUNY New Paltz shares my commitment to high quality liberal education. I look forward to helping the university expand its reputation for excellence by increasing opportunities to better meet the needs of students."

Mills holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from Baylor University in Texas and she earned a Juris Doctor degree from the University of Kansas.

Dylan Hurley, Program Assistant

Dylan Hurley is the new Program Assistant for Graduate and Extended Learning at SUNY New Paltz, having been in the role since August 2017. He acts as the Liaison between the department and the Lifetime Learners Institute. His other duties include managing the University in the High School Programs,

managing graduate testing on campus, and coordinating the Winter & Summer Sessions on campus.



Prior to working at New Paltz, Dylan was an AmeriCorps VISTA with Hudson River Housing in Poughkeepsie for two years, working on community building. He graduated from Wheaton College in Massachusetts with a Liberal Arts Degree in Film and New Media Studies, and Sociology. He is a native of the Hudson Valley.








This year LLI embarked on a new partnership with the Department of Theatre at SUNY New Paltz. The class, entitled Season Ticket, focused around two performances, a dramatic adaptation of *To Kill a Mockingbird* and Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. The Program was developed by Jessica Rothman, the current president of LLI, who prior to her retirement, was a theatre educator and director of student and summer camp fully staged productions. She has produced and directed more than 50 Broadway musicals, Shakespeare festivals and special theatre programs.

Backstage became a real thing when LLI members were given a tour of the working part of the Theater Arts program. Participants learned that SUNY students not only perform in the plays, but each play includes student developed set design, lighting, costume and design, and drawing & painting, as well as stage management and technology. They also learned of the role of a dramaturg who contextualizes the world of a play; and establishes connections among the text, actors, and audience.





In the weeks prior to each performance there was an orientation session led by Jessica Rothman, the organizer of the program, to discuss the premise of the story/play. Members attended an open rehearsal of each play which included a discussion with the student actors and the faculty involved in the production. Immediately following each performance there was a talk-back with some of the performers allowing LLI members to comment on their reactions to seeing a final performance and comparing it to the rehearsal.

Seeing and participating in the "backstage production" opened the eyes of many an LLI member and enhanced the enjoyment of the plays by seeing all the hard work that went into each production. All who participated in this class were glad to join the SUNY students and faculty in this "dynamic, experiential, and diverse educational experience."

Interactive and spontaneous, playback theatre bases its material on the stories of the community. In theatres, workshops, and a wide range of educational and organizational settings, Playback Theatre draws people together and allows fresh perspectives.

Performances are carried out by a team of actors, emcee (called the conductor), and musician. As the show begins, audience members respond to questions from the conductor, then watch as actors and musician create brief theatre pieces on the spot. Later, volunteers from the audience come to the stage to tell longer stories, choosing actors to play the main roles. Although performances often focus on a theme of interest or concern, the performers follow no narrative agenda, but bring their dramatic skills and their humanity to embodying on the stage the concerns and experiences of audience members..

Playback theatre is practiced in over 50 countries.
