Changes coming to the major

Some big changes are coming to the Political Science and International Relations majors this fall semester. After consulting with students and evaluating assessment results for the department, we have decided to institute a few changes:

- POL 300 **Scope and Methods of Political Science** moves from three to four credits. This allows you extra time and instruction to nail down SPSS and regression analysis.
- All Senior Seminars move from three to four credits. You asked for more time to work on your papers in the seminars, and we heard you.
- A new Junior Seminar (POL 390). This elective course introduces seminar-level work in the junior year. We plan on offering one or two of these every semester, staffed by full-time members of the department and focused on their area of expertise.

We've also reduced the Elective Course requirements in both Political Science and in International Relations by three credits (from 15 to 12 credits in International Relations, and from 9 to 6 credits in Political Science). This new credit-level requirement will affect *only new students to the major*. If you want to be considered under the new requirements, you'll have to redeclare your Political Science or International Relations major after the beginning of the Fall 2016 semester (come to the department office).

On pages six and seven of this newsletter you can find preliminary schedules for the 2016-2017 academic year, including the new credit levels.

Seminars. We have three seminars scheduled for next year. In the fall, Professor Schwartz will offer one in IR. In the spring, Professor Minkoff will offer an American seminar, and Professor Mauceri will offer a comparative seminar (housed in the Latin American Studies Program).

Seminar seats go to students based on credit levels, and *you must register your* preference with the department to reserve a spot. Email Jeff Miller (millerj@newpaltz.edu) to do this.


