# **State University of New York at New Paltz**

This **eight-semester plan** (see <u>important details</u>) is intended to guide a first-year student through a four-year undergraduate career, with completion of an academic major and all college-wide degree requirements. The plan is designed as an **advising tool** — a starting point for careful discussions between a student and his/her academic adviser. In consultation, the student and adviser will adjust the plan to accommodate the student's prerequisite needs, transferred credits, and other such variables.

Students are responsible for reviewing their <u>Progress Reports</u> each semester to track their own progress toward degree requirements.

Choose one of the following courses: <u>ANT214 Cultural Anthropology (WRLD)</u>, <u>ANT404 Political Anthropology</u>, GEO274 Environment and Culture (SSCI)

Choose one of the following international economics courses (prereq required - <u>ECO206</u> Principles of Microeconomics OR <u>ECO207</u> Principles of Macroeconomics): <u>ECO302 Comparative Economic Systems</u>, <u>ECO401 International Trade and Finance</u>, <u>ECO418 Economics of Development</u>

Majors are required to complete twelve (12) elective credits by advisement, selected from among those courses accepted for credit in the International Relations major/minor program. No more than one course may be at the 200 level. Three courses (9 credits) must be taken in the Department of Political Science & International Relations.

Additional electives: Six (6) credits by advisement are to focus on a single world area (Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, or Middle East), selected from among

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courses accepted for credit in the International Relations major/minor program.

Optional course to prepare students for the demands of the senior seminar. May count toward the elective requirement.
