Faculty Highlight



Professor William Rhoads

Gauged by the sheer number of students clambering to get into his classes, William Rhoads is one of the stars of the SUNY New Paltz Lifetime Learning Institute faculty. During LLI's first three semesters, Bill's courses on architectural history have attracted about fifty students in each session, which is approximately a quarter of the LLI program's total enrollment.

"The class was lively and the slides that went along with the lecture helped illustrate the important aspects of the talk. The topic was presented so that without a background in the subject I could understand and appreciate the class each week," said Linda Worden, a repeat student.

Bill can't really remember a time when he wasn't intrigued by "history as seen through architecture," for which he credits his parents. Family vacations were spent exploring the country by car; historic buildings ripe for investigation by the three Rhoads boys were among the entertaining stops. In fact, his FDR era course is enriched by a slide illustrating a long ago demolished house across from the famous president's home in Hyde Park ~ taken by Bill's father while four year-old Bill played just out of camera range.

As a young man at Princeton, Bill assumed he would pursue a profes-

sion deemed "serious" by his parents. Ultimately, however, the rigors of premed chemistry only served to enhance the allure of his elective art history courses. Professor Donald Egbert's course highlighted John Notman's Princeton architecture ~ illustrated by the professor's own photos. Now, here was worthy work young Bill could imagine himself enjoying!

For more than thirty years at SUNY New Paltz, Professor Rhoads developed and refined his work on local art and architecture. He especially loved teaching that course, and after retirement missed sharing his lectures. Talks to regional organizations helped, and led to single LLI lectures at both Bard and Marist. When New Paltz LLI got underway he knew he wanted to be a part of it.

"The students are very curious about the material and their questions are always thoughtful," he observed.

The students are equally enthusiastic about their professor.
