#### Mini-Russian Film Festival

#### 3 Wednesdays in January 2012 at Woodland Pond

Note: Woodland Pond is in New Paltz at 100 Woodland Pond Circle. Woodland Pond Circle is on North Putt Corners Rd. 1.3 miles from Main Street (from Route 299). Manuela Dobos, retired Professor of Russian and East European History (College of Staten Island, C.U.N.Y) will introduce each film and lead the discussion.



This year's LLI exploration of the development of Russian film will be presented in three films:

Wed. Jan. 4, at Woodland Pond at 1 p.m. "Ballad of a Soldier"

(Grigorii Chukhrai) 1959, 88 minutes. Covers the post-Stalin "thaw" of the 1950's. A young soldier is allowed to return briefly from the front (World War II) to help his mother in the village. The film records his experiences in life in those few days: simple and deeply human. It marks a distinct departure from the nationalist hero worship and triumphalism of all Soviet movies since the 1930's.

Wed. Jan. 11, at Woodland Pond at 1 p.m. "Commissar"

(Aleksandr Askoldov) 1967, 110 minutes. Covers the great burst of creativity of the 1960's. A tough woman officer of the Red Army during the Civil War (1918-1921) must take shelter with a Jewish family because she is pregnant. Not only are emotional attachments the main theme, but also the film is the first recognition in Soviet movies of Jews in their own culture and with their own special fate in Russia. This film was not shown until 1987.

Wed. Jan. 18, at Woodland Pond at 1 p.m.. "Moscow Does Not Believe in Tears" Vladimir Menshov) 1980, 142 minutes. Covers the great burst of creativity of the 1960's, the pre-"glasnost" ("openness") period of the late 1970s, tracing the lives of three women who come to Moscow for a better life. Film won an Oscar for best foreign film in 1981.

My Fair Lady is the renowned and award winning musical based upon Shaw's play, Pygmalion in which a "lowly gutter snipe," Eliza Doolittle, is transformed into a lady by Professor Henry Higgins (run time, almost 3 hrs.).
