## Junior Seminar in Political Science: Post-Conflict Peacebuilding

**Fall 2017: MH 2-3:15\* space still available!**

### Overview

This class focuses on an old problem but one that has received new international attention since the end of the Cold War: how to rebuild states and societies after political conflict, particularly after civil or internal conflict. Since the early 1990s, the predominant form of warfare across the globe has been civil war in which two or more armed groups fight each other for territorial control in an internationally recognized state. Whereas global powers often neglected such “small wars,” their importance has increased significantly since the end of the Cold War. The policy world has encouraged investment in a standard set of prescriptions: international peacekeepers, democratization, power-sharing institutions, disarmament, demobilization, and reintegration of rebels, and some mechanism to acknowledge war crimes. Yet, the record suggests that a great deal of variation exists in the policies and approaches that post-war governments pursue. Why do some governments pursue a particular package of initiatives while others do not? And why do the majority of countries that experience civil war fall back into civil war, most often within 5 years of reaching an agreement on peace. The SUNY Model EU Study Mission in Brussels, Belgium is a 12 day, 3-credit Study Abroad experience that includes participation in the transatlantic Model EU simulation, as well as an extended and intensive week of scholarly inquiry into the policymaking process of the European Union. Students participating in the Study Mission will prepare for the simulation at their own universities with the help of faculty at New Paltz and Albany (remotely). Preparatory materials, a syllabus, and advance readings will be posted to the study mission Blackboard page, accessible by password to students on any SUNY campus. In addition to preparing their country and alter ego's position on the simulation's agenda items, Study Mission participants will do some additional readings prior to departure on Belgian Politics, the EU policy process, and the "case study" areas of **immigration policy and immigrant integration**.
