

Bachelor's Degree Program Application, Adolescence Education

The Adolescence Education Department's BA and BS degree programs lead to eligibility for initial New York State teaching certification for grades 7-12 in the areas of English, mathematics, science (biology, chemistry, earth science, physics), or social studies.

These rigorous programs are designed for candidates who are "committed to becoming caring, critical, and reflective professionals responsive to the needs of a diverse society." Program graduates must demonstrate competence in the following areas: critical inquiry and intellectual development, professional skills and disposition, culturally responsive practice and social justice, and democratic citizenship and student advocacy.

These programs require extensive pre-student teaching field experiences in addition to a full semester student teaching in both a middle and a high school. Fieldwork and student teaching sites are in a variety of regional schools within one hour of the New Paltz campus. Students remain responsible for their own transportation and must understand that some sites require up to an hour commute. Some programs offer fieldwork in other locations in NYS.

To enter the Adolescence Education Programs, students need:

- 1) 3.0 overall GPA in college coursework
- 2) Minimum of grade B in required freshman English composition courses
- 3) Completion of program application, including an acceptable essay
- 4) Students in the mathematics program must receive a B- or better in Calculus 1 or B- or better in Calculus 2.

Information about the Student Teaching Experience:

Student Teaching is a capstone experience for all undergraduate secondary teacher candidates seeking a bachelor's degree. It is a full-time commitment extending for an entire semester with placements in two different settings. As such, the School of Education requires that all required coursework is completed BEFORE the capstone experience begins, and it restricts candidates from taking any other course(s) while registered for student teaching except the co-requisite fieldwork 3 and the student teaching seminar.

Information about GPA Requirements for Methods:

All Adolescence Education/7-12 students must have a 3.0 GPA to register for methods. Students unable to meet this GPA prerequisite will be advised to change their major so they can graduate in a timely manner.
